## Change Starts With You

Know the facts about contributing to minors law

## Change happens when you no longer accept the norm:

"A few drinks never hurt anybody."

"I'll just do it this one time. It's a special occasion."

"It's no big deal."

## Change happens when you understand the law:

According to Nebraska State Statute 53-180, contributing to the delinquency of a minor is a Class I misdemeanor. Providing alcohol to persons under the age of 21 is considered a violation of this statute.

## Change happens when you know the consequences:

A class I misdemeanor is the most severe misdemeanor charge in Nebraska. Being charged with this class of crime could result in a \$1,000 fine or up to one year in jail, or both.

Also, those who buy alcohol for a minor who then becomes intoxicated and injures or kills an innocent third party, otherwise, can be liable in a law suit. This could cost the purchaser or the procurer of the alcohol millions.

Beyond breaking the law, there are also the health and social risks to consider. Youth who drink alcohol are more likely to experience:

- School problems, such as higher absence and poor or failing grades.
- Social problems, such as fighting and lack of participation in youth activities.
- Physical problems, such as hangovers or illnesses.
- Unwanted, unplanned, and unprotected sexual activity.
- Disruption of normal growth and sexual development.
- Physical and sexual assault.
- Higher risk for suicide and homicide.
- Alcohol-related car crashes and other unintentional injuries, such as burns, falls and drowning.
- Memory problems.
- Abuse of other drugs.
- Changes in brain development that may have life-long effects.
- Death from alcohol poisoning.
